## VIRGINIA HUMANITIES CONFERENCE MARY WASHINGTON COLLEGE APRIL 10-12 1997

Our theme this year is the concept of "the Other", and its impact on the humanities. To explore it, we have selected twenty-four presentations from a national call for papers, and invited several scholars for keynote talks and a plenary panel.

PRE-REGISTRATION: The pre-registration form for the conference is attached; please return it as soon as possible, with your check made payable to "Virginia Humanities Conference". Note the additional cost for the lunch on Friday. When you arrive, your registration packet will include a list of restaurants in Fredericksburg, as you will be on your own for dinner Friday evening.

LODGING: We have arranged with Hampton Inn for a conference rate of \$50 for single, \$55 for double occupancy; to get these rates, rooms must be reserved before March 24. You can call the Fredericksburg Hampton Inn at 540-371-0330, or the toll-free number 1-800-Hampton to make the reservation. ("VHC" is the code to provide). The Hampton Inn is located immediately east of I-95 (Exit 130A), on Route 3, and is about 1 1/2 miles from MWC. We'll be arranging some shuttle service with MWC vans for those who need it. There is also bus service from the Hampton Inn to downtown Fredericksburg, with a stop at MWC. Fredericksburg also has a Sheraton Inn (540-786-8321).

TRANSPORTATION: Fredericksburg is 50 miles north of Richmond, 50 miles south of Washington, DC. If you are coming by car, from I-95, you take Exit 130A, then Route 3 east about a mile, and turn left on William Street (a major intersection with traffic lights and two left turn lanes); your next traffic light will be at College Avenue. Turn left, the campus will be on your right. Signs guiding you to The Woodard Center will be posted.

If you are not coming by car, Fredericksburg is served by Amtrak and Greyhound, as well as being a stop on the Groome Airport Shuttle service from both Washington National Airport and Richmond Airport. (Information on Groome's schedule: 1-800-552-7911)

A map of the campus, and advice about parking will be sent, along with the finalized program, in late March to those who pre-register.

We are looking forward to an exciting conference this Spring, and hope you will help spread the word about the VHC. Please take a moment to send in your pre-registration form and check *right away*. We depend on registration fees to cover the costs of the conference, and pre-registration is essential for planning the food arrangements.
